

Settler Logics, Imaginaries, and Investments: Constructions of the Latinx 'Other' in Suburban and Small-Town Ohio High Schools

Dr. Sánchez Loza studies the political development occurring in and through two predominantly white high schools in central Ohio: the reproduction of settler politics generally, and the constructions of the Latinx "Other" specifically.

Culled from a year-long comparative ethnography of two schools—one in an affluent suburb, the other in a working-class small town—she explores how students deploy settler logics, imaginaries, and investments in their constructions of Latinxs and perceived Latinx issues. By focusing on the development of racialized settler ideologies, this talk challenges the idea of "good schools" and troubles the civic education occurring therein.
